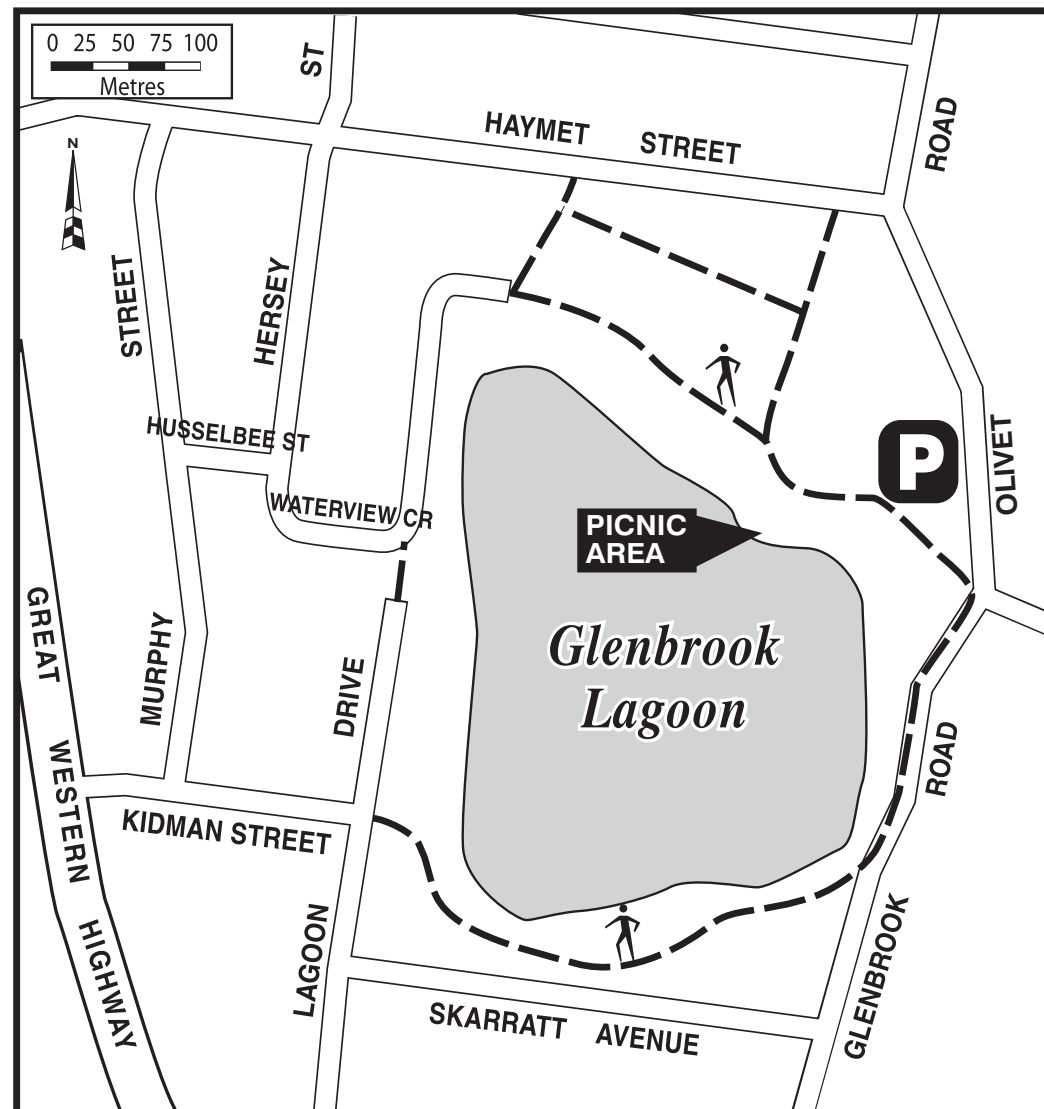


The Community is the Centre of this Lagoon

Join us in helping to look after the lagoon

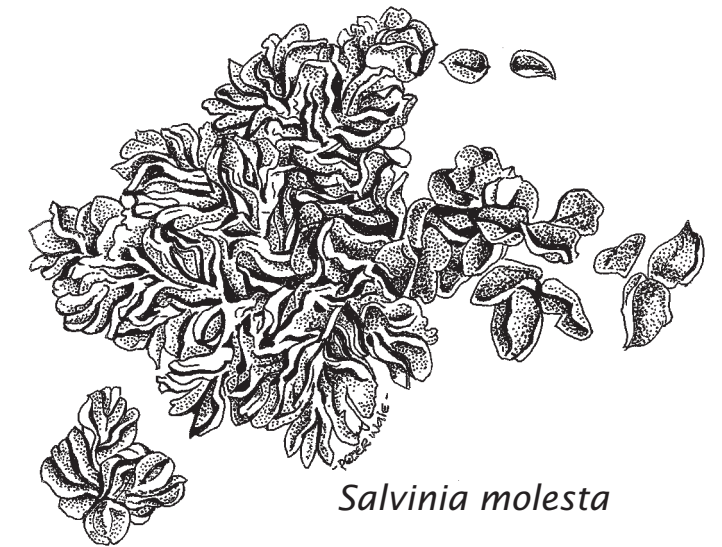
Can you see water bugs in the lagoon? These macro-invertebrates are important bio-indicators in determining the water's health. A Stream Watch group meets here regularly to measure the lagoon's water quality. Council supports an Aquatic Bushcare Group.

Salvinia & Cabomba – Weeds of National Significance

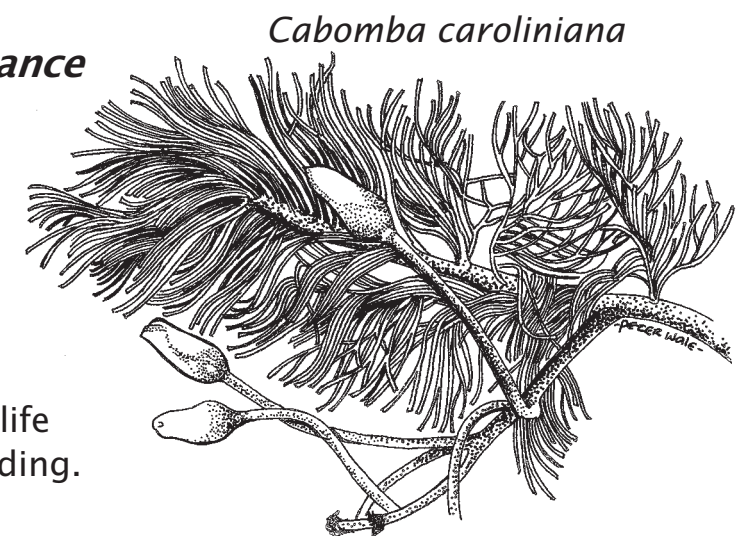
Salvinia floats on the surface of the Lagoon and Cabomba lives underwater. Both plants were most likely introduced to the Lagoon by people disposing of them from fish ponds and aquariums.

These weeds choke the lagoon, reduce fish stocks, replace native aquatic plants, prevent birds and other wildlife from using the water source and increase mosquito breeding.
